



## **SHOPPING LIST FOR YOUR NEW RABBIT**

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 1. Cage**

The cage must be at least 36” long, 24” wide, and 18” high, with 1” bar spacing. Do not purchase a cage that has wire floors.

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 2. Rabbit Pellets**

Rabbits should be fed fresh, high quality pellets. Buy in smaller quantities (5-10 pound bags) so it does not spoil or become rancid. Do not purchase a feed that is medicated or supplemented with dried food and seed (it is very high in sugar and fat).

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 3. Timothy Hay**

A constant supply of good quality hay must be available 24 hours a day.

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 4. Fresh Vegetables**

Rabbits should be fed fresh vegetables daily. Including: red leaf and romaine lettuce, dandelion greens and flowers, carrots and tops, collards, mustard greens, beet greens, radish tops, raddichio, clover, pea pods, bok choy, and escarole. Fresh herbs could include: parsley, basil, mint, cilantro, and dill.

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 8. Bedding**

Use organic dust-free litter such as Care Fresh, Cat Country, or Nature Fresh. Do not use clay litter or clumping litter. Never use cedar or pine-based bedding.

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 9. Litterbox (and white vinegar for cleaning litterbox)**

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 10. Toys**

Natural wood blocks, hard plastic or wire balls with bells, hanging bird toys, baby toys such as rattles and giant key rings, untreated straw baskets, grass/straw/rice mats, canning jar rings, cardboard condos, toilet paper/ paper towel rolls, shredded paper and newspapers, and brown paper bags with handles cut off.

### **\_\_\_\_\_ 11. Grooming Tools**

Purchase a “Zoom Groom” or other grooming brush, nail clippers, and styptic powder
